Ted is living in a home, in Laguna Niguel, which was the site of the original Laguna Niguel Ranch's stable. In his restoration of this historical home and land he discovered many artifacts which he has preserved, featured, and incorporated into the design within his home and is very eager to share with those who have interest in this history of the original Ranch.

His 2nd Act Program:

Laguna Niguel: Historical Interventions, Intentions, and Preceptions.

Laguna Niguel, one of the earliest master-planned communities in California which has one of the longest histories related to creation, experimentation, and the relationships of public and private spaces.

For the 21st century, we have optional and strengthening forms of social activity in a city space that offers challenges for the future based on our rich past, far beyond what we often perceive as the history of the community. We will explore the city from eye-level and how that makes the individual experience here as part of an evolving and strong community.

The Horizon House was the first home that went up in the master-planned community.

It was a startling sight for a private pilot buzzing over the Southland Coast in the spring of 1964. A flying saucer had touched down in the rugged hills of the old Rancho Niguel, a sheep ranch just a mile from the Pacific.

A dip of the wings, a drop in elevation, and the pilot might have spotted a roadside sign—'visit the Horizon House.' The house, all concrete and glass and circular, with a floating, scalloped concrete roof, was open to the public every day from 9 to 5. Thousands of people trooped through.

Built "to show you could make beautiful things with pre-cast concrete," in the words of its structural engineer, Hanns Baumann, the Horizon House was simultaneously a promotion for the concrete industry, an idea house suggesting the future of home building, a house for sale—and the first house in the new master-planned community of Laguna Niguel.

The checks have been sent to the schools and thank you letters have been received. The Education Committee will follow up on the use of this grant money in these teaching units.


Horizon House

The architect who designed the house was not, as is often said, George Bissell, who designed the 72 other homes in the tract. It was the Pasadena firm John Galbraith Associates, Wells says. Wells had interviewed Bissell before the architect's death.

But Bissell had the challenging job of working with engineer Hans Baumann to turn the design into reality. The task involved attaching pre-cast concrete wedges to inner steel rings, inflating a giant balloon-like form to hold things in place, and shooting on a slurry of gunite.

"It's all held up like a tree trunk from that central core." Wells said of the house
